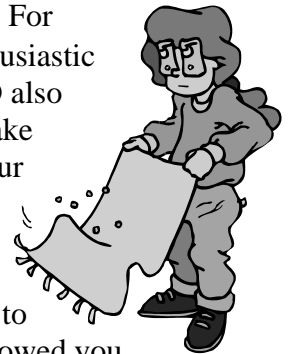

Process

Include the steps of the gospel throughout the lesson; so while student attention is fresh, the real lesson is being planted.

“Shake the rugs Tina!” “Awww, mom...” For most of us, we’ll shake the rugs but certainly not be enthusiastic about it. It’d probably scare her if you shook them AND also made a big sign and hung it on your dresser, saying “Shake rugs each Saturday”. She would probably call one of your schoolteachers to check and see if you’d been kicked out of school.



Can you guess your dad’s surprise when his instructions to you were to sweep out the garage and later inspection showed you had done that AND also hung up all the lawn tools AND replaced the burnt out bulb over his workbench?

How would you feel if the doctor that’s going to do your knee surgery just does a carefree work in the operating room? Well, you’d definitely want him to put his heart into his work. Or how about the pilot flying your dad back from his business trip. What would you say to the pilot if he put no more pride in the things he does, than those you do?

The Contest

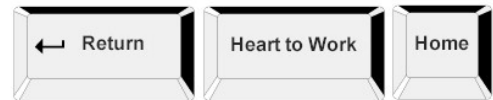
Create two teams – Red and Blue. Try to make them as even as possible by age and gender. A judge scores the responses to each scenario. Alternating back and forth, one team poses an action-based situation for the other. The other team must think of an action response that shows a **heart-felt** concern for meeting the need of the scenario.

The situations should be rather mundane real-life situations.

The point of the red-blue game is to prove to ourselves that we already know how to go the extra mile – to put our heart into a task before us. Why?

1. That is what we expect of others.
 2. A healthy family thrives on it.
 3. A healthy business must have it in their employees.
 4. This is a good way to show others that God is more powerful than satan's forces.
 5. Most importantly, God's Word demands it and gives many examples.
- Whether at school, home, or work, satan will actively, with great effort try to thwart our efforts to work in a way that pleases God. We need to aggressively develop or enhance our passion our deep desire for the things we do.

If not, time is wasted, money is spent foolishly, relationships begin breaking down, our witness moves toward being phoney. If your heart isn't in it, you will probably not finish the project or meet the goal. To have a heart for the work says that you will define clearly what the goal is and set a date to have it done... maybe even have intermediate ones. For example your plan might be:



1. **Get permission from Pastor – by June 14th.**
2. **Put numbers on all the audio tapes of the sermons. – by July 10th.**
3. **List the subject of each tape on the computer. – by September 1st.**
4. **Print them out for Pastor. – by September 15th.**

“And these things I'm going to do, even if no one else helps me.

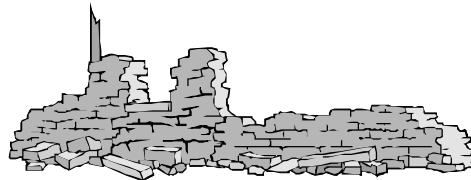
God's Word is filled with examples of determined people, both good and bad, and how they affected others. Ask your students what IIPeter 5:8 tells us about determination.

Mr. Nehemiah became broken hearted to the point of tears when he learned the city of Jerusalem layed in ruins. (Nehemiah 1:4) The verse says he fasted and prayed.

And then in chapter 6:15 the was wall was finished. And in 52 days too! That's pretty fast. This monumental work was done quickly, carefully, and done with great opposition. Let's see who the workers were and what they did.

- Each family had their defined goal of repairing a specified part of the city wall. Chapter 3.
- Learning of obstacles they prayed. 4:8
- Enemy mocked the workers. 4:2
- God provided the supplies (through the king) . 2:7,8



- Every kind of person helped. Mayor's children 3:9,12. Girls helped too 3:12.
- Everyone had a weapon by their side. 4:17
- An alarm system (trumpet) and defense plan established. 4:18-20
- The enemies were discouraged and recognized the work was done by God. 6:16

More exciting things are learned by another large construction project in the second book of the Bible, Exodus. The tabernacle was being built and shows us more interesting things of people who had a heart to Work.

- God provides training for the task. Exodus 35:34
- People willingly brought more than enough supplies for the task. Ex. 36:5-7
- Chapter 35 and 36 chock full of mentions of their willingness for the work.

So the conclusion is that to reach your goal and finish your computer task, follow the many detailed examples in God's Word. ☺
